

**ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS, PROFESSIONS AND

The jurisdiction of the Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee includes the regulation of healing arts and non-healing arts professions; licensing and enforcement issues for all boards and bureaus within the Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA); creation and elimination (sunsetting) of agencies, boards and commissions under DCA; certain elements of the Department of General Services; charitable solicitations; product labeling (except agricultural and medical); and consumer protection generally, including privacy.

During the 2013 session of the California State Legislature, the Committee held a total of 22 hearings, including three joint Sunset Review hearings with the Senate Business, Professions and Economic Development Committee, and two joint hearings with the Assembly Select Committee on Privacy.

A total of 123 bills were referred to the Committee during 2013, of which 90 were heard and 87 passed by the Committee. A substantial majority of those 123 referred bills dealt with the Committee's primary area of concern – the regulated professions.

Professional regulation affects dozens of businesses and licensees throughout California, including: accountancy; acupuncture; architects; automotive repair; barbering and cosmetology; behavioral sciences; contractors; court reporters; dentists and dental auxiliaries; dispensing opticians; electronic and appliance repair; funeral, cemetery, and crematory establishments; geologists and geophysicists; guide dogs for the blind; hearing aid dispensers; home furnishings and thermal insulation; land surveyors; landscape architects; massage professionals; midwives; nurse assistants; optometrists; pharmacists; physical therapists; physicians and surgeons; physician assistants; podiatrists; private postsecondary and vocational education; professional engineers; professional fiduciaries; psychiatric technicians; psychologists; registered nurses; respiratory care; security and investigative services; speech-language pathology and audiology; structural pest control; telephone medical advice; veterinarians and veterinary technicians; and vocational nurses.

The Committee also sees a broad range of legislation that deals with commerce and consumer protection generally, including: advertising, vehicle sales, junk dealers and recyclers, green building standards for state buildings, pharmacies, Internet privacy, franchising, and prescription drugs.

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**20 SELECTED ASSEMBLY AND SENATE BILLS REFERRED TO THE
ASSEMBLY BUSINESS, PROFESSIONS AND CONSUMER PROTECTION
COMMITTEE DURING THE 2013 LEGISLATIVE SESSION**

AB 154 (Atkins) Abortion.

Authorizes a nurse practitioner, certified nurse midwife, and physician assistant to perform an abortion by aspiration techniques, in addition to medication, in the first trimester of pregnancy upon completion of specified training and validation of clinical competency, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 662, Statutes of 2013.

AB 370 (Muratsuchi) Consumers: internet privacy.

Requires privacy policies posted by an operator of a commercial Web site or online service that collects personally identifiable information (PII) to disclose how the operator responds to Web browser "do not track" signals regarding the collection of PII, and to disclose whether other parties may collect PII about an individual consumer's online activities.

Last Action: Chapter 390, Statutes of 2013.

AB 459 (Mitchell) Public contracts: healthy and sustainable food.

Revises the current "accepted nutritional guidelines" for food and beverages in a vending machine on designated state property, and requires the food and beverages to reach 50% compliance with the revised guidelines beginning January 1, 2015, 75% compliance on January 1, 2016, and 100% compliance on and after January 1, 2017.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 890 (Jones) False advertising.

Aligns California with the federal standard regarding the use of the terms "Made in U.S.A.," "Made in America," "U.S.A." or similar words when a product or any portion of the product was not substantially produced in the United States.

Last Action: Held in Senate Judiciary Committee.

AB 980 (Pan) Primary care clinics: abortion.

Requires the California Building Standards Commission, in conjunction with the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development, to repeal certain regulations and sections of the California Building Standards Code that treat primary clinics that provide abortion services differently from those that do not.

Last Action: Chapter 663, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1000 (Wieckowski and Maienschein) Physical therapists: direct access to services: professional corporations.

Allows patients to access physical therapy services without a referral for 45 calendar days or 12 visits, whichever comes first, after which the patient must receive an in-person examination from a physician and surgeon or podiatrist, who must also sign off on the physical therapist's plan of care; expands the types of licensed professionals

permitted to work for a professional corporation; and permits a licensed physical therapist to be a shareholder, officer, or director of a medical and podiatric professional corporation, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 620, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1045 (Quirk-Silva) Sterile compounding and nonresident pharmacies.

Requires a recipient pharmacy, prescriber, or patient of a recalled drug and the California Board of Pharmacy to be notified within 12 hours of a recall notice for a sterile compounded drug, and requires the automatic suspension, cancellation, or revocation of a California pharmacy license if an out-of-state pharmacy's home state license is suspended, cancelled, or revoked.

Last Action: Chapter 302, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1147 (Gomez) Massage therapy.

Revises the qualifications for certification as a massage practitioner and massage therapist, and allows a city, county, or city and county to require the owner of a massage business to obtain a revocable certificate of registration, as specified.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1308 (Bonilla) Midwifery.

Revises the scope of practice for a licensed midwife (LM) to remove the requirement of supervision by a physician and surgeon; authorizes an LM to directly obtain supplies and devices, obtain and administer drugs and diagnostic tests, order testing, and receive reports that are necessary to his or her practice of midwifery; and authorizes an LM to attend cases of normal birth.

Last Action: Chapter 665, Statutes of 2013.

SB 62 (Lieu) Coroners: reporting requirements: prescription drug use.

Requires a coroner to report to the Medical Board of California when he or she receives information indicating that a death was caused by a Schedule II, III, or IV drug, as specified, until January 1, 2018.

Last Action: Vetoed.

SB 304 (Lieu) Healing arts: boards.

Makes various revisions developed as a result of the joint Sunset Review process, including amending the Medical Practice Act to transfer inspectors from the Medical Board of California (MBC) to the Division of Investigation within the Department of Consumer Affairs and extend the sunset date of MBC by four years, and amending the Veterinary Practice Act to extend its sunset date by two years.

Last Action: Chapter 515, Statutes of 2013.

SB 465 (Correa) Packaging and labeling: containers: slack fill.

Revises the definition for "nonfunctional slack fill" prohibited in packaged goods to require that nonfunctional slack fill be substantially less than the allowed capacity, and

clarifies a particular exemption to require the actual size of the product be clearly and conspicuously depicted on any side of the exterior packaging, except the bottom.

Last Action: Chapter 429, Statutes of 2013.

SB 491 (Hernandez) Nurse practitioners.

Permits a nurse practitioner (NP) to practice independently after a period of physician supervision if the NP has national certification and liability insurance, and authorizes the NP to perform various other specified tasks related to the practice of nursing without protocols.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

SB 492 (Hernandez) Optometrists: practice: licensure.

Permits an optometrist to diagnose, treat and manage additional conditions with ocular manifestations; directs the California Board of Optometry to establish educational and examination requirements; and permits optometrists to perform vaccinations and surgical and non-surgical primary care procedures, as specified.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

SB 493 (Hernandez) Pharmacy practice.

Expands the pharmacist scope of practice to recognize an "advanced practice pharmacist"; permits pharmacists to furnish certain hormonal contraceptives, nicotine replacement products, and prescription medications for travel, as specified; and authorizes pharmacists to independently initiate and administer certain vaccines and treatments for severe allergic reactions.

Last Action: Chapter 469, Statutes of 2013.

SB 598 (Hill) Biosimilars.

Permits a pharmacist to substitute a biological pharmaceutical with a biosimilar pharmaceutical in the same manner as generic drugs are substituted, and for prescriptions filled prior to January 1, 2017, requires the pharmacist to notify the prescriber.

Last Action: Vetoed.

SB 610 (Jackson) Franchises.

Revises the California Franchise Relations Act to explicitly require franchisors and franchisees to deal with each other in good faith, as defined, in the performance and enforcement of a franchise agreement; prohibits a franchisor from restricting the right of a franchisee to join or participate in an association of franchisees; and authorizes a private right of action for violation of these provisions that may be remedied by injunctive relief, damages, rescission, reasonable costs, or attorneys' fees.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

SB 670 (Steinberg) Physicians and surgeons: drug prescribing privileges: investigation.

Authorizes the Medical Board of California to inspect and copy a deceased patient's medical records, clarifies language relating to unprofessional conduct, and permits an interim suspension order to place restrictions on a physician's prescribing privileges, as specified

Last Action: Chapter 399, Statutes of 2013.

SB 686 (Jackson) Vehicles: vehicle dealers.

Prohibits a vehicle dealer from selling, leasing, renting, loaning, or otherwise transferring ownership of a used vehicle if the dealer knows or should have known that the vehicle is subject to a manufacturer's safety recall, and places similar restrictions on the sale or transfer of ownership of a used vehicle by a rental car company that is also a licensed dealer.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

SB 809 (DeSaulnier and Steinberg) Controlled substances: reporting.

Establishes a funding mechanism to update and maintain the Controlled Substance Utilization Review and Evaluation System (CURES) and Prescription Drug Monitoring Program, requires all prescribing health care practitioners to apply to access CURES information, and establishes processes and procedures for regulating prescribing licensees through CURES and securing private information.

Last Action: Chapter 400, Statutes of 2013.

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**ALL ASSEMBLY BILLS
REFERRED TO THE ASSEMBLY BUSINESS, PROFESSIONS AND CONSUMER
PROTECTION COMMITTEE DURING
THE 2013 SESSION OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE LEGISLATURE**

AB 44 (Buchanan) Subletting and Subcontracting Fair Practices Act: bidding practices.

Requires a licensed contractor to include the contractor license number of each subcontractor listed in any bid or offer submitted after July 1, 2014, for the construction of any public work.

Last Action: Chapter 258, Statutes of 2013.

AB 154 (Atkins) Abortion.

Authorizes a nurse practitioner, certified nurse midwife, and physician assistant to perform an abortion by aspiration techniques, in addition to medication, in the first trimester of pregnancy upon completion of specified training and validation of clinical competency, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 662, Statutes of 2013.

AB 186 (Maienschein) Professions and vocations: military spouses: temporary licenses.

Requires all licensing entities under the Department of Consumer Affairs to provide military spouses and domestic partners who hold a valid professional license in another state with an 18 month provisional license to practice in California.

Last Action: Held in Senate Business, Professions and Economic Development Committee.

AB 213 (Logue) Healing arts: licensure and certification requirements: military experience.

Establishes the Veterans Health Care Workforce Act of 2013, which requires schools accredited by healing arts boards within the Department of Consumer Affairs and the State Department of Public Health to accept satisfactory evidence of an applicant's education, training, and practical experience completed during military service towards licensure or certification, as specified.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 242 (Chau) Privacy: Internet.

Requires the privacy policy for a commercial Web site or online service that collects personally identifiable information about its individual consumers residing in California to be no more than 100 words, written in clear and concise language, and written at no greater than an 8th grade reading level, and to disclose whether that personally identifiable information may be sold or shared with others, and if so, how and with whom.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Judiciary Committee.

AB 249 (Donnelly) Invasion of privacy.

Makes technical changes to provisions describing the invasion of privacy resulting from the use of new devices and techniques developed for the purpose of eavesdropping on private communications.

Last Action: This bill was substantially amended to address an unrelated issue: Firearms: open carry prohibitions.

AB 252 (Yamada and Eggman) Social workers.

Prohibits an individual from holding himself or herself out professionally as a "social worker" unless he or she has received a degree from an accredited academic institution.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 257 (Hall) Privacy: commercial Web sites and online services.

Requires an operator of a commercial Web site to include in its privacy policy the uses and retention period for each category of personally identifiable information and the process that allows an individual consumer to review and request changes to any of his or her personally identifiable information. Requires the operator to use reasonable security safeguards to protect personally identifiable information from unauthorized access, use, disclosure, modification, or destruction, and to describe these safeguards, as specified.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Judiciary Committee.

AB 259 (Logue) Health and care facilities: CPR.

Makes it a misdemeanor for a long-term health care facility, community care facility, adult day health care center, or residential care facility for the elderly, to have a policy that prohibits any employee from administering cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), except when there is a "do not resuscitate" (DNR) form or other similar instructions, as specified

Last Action: Held in Senate Health Committee.

AB 291 (Nestande) California Sunset Review Commission.

Abolishes the Joint Sunset Review Committee and establishes the California Sunset Review Commission to assess the continuing need for government agencies, as specified.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Accountability and Administrative Review Committee.

AB 299 (Holden) Prescription drug benefits.

Prohibits pharmacies from contracting with a health care service plan or disability insurer that requires mail-order only service, or imposes an opt-out process for mail-order service.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 370 (Muratsuchi) Consumers: internet privacy.

Requires privacy policies posted by an operator of a commercial Web site or online service that collects personally identifiable information (PII) to disclose how the operator

responds to Web browser “do not track” signals regarding the collection of PII, and to disclose whether other parties may collect PII about an individual consumer’s online activities.

Last Action: Chapter 390, Statutes of 2013.

AB 399 (Fox) Clinical laboratories.

Authorizes the State Department of Public Health to charge appropriate license fees whenever it determines that a new category of licensure is necessary to direct a laboratory or to perform clinical laboratory tests or examinations in specific specialties or subspecialties.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 404 (Eggman) Healing arts: behavioral sciences: retired licenses.

Reduces from five to three the number of years a licensed marriage and family therapist, licensed educational psychologist, licensed clinical social worker and licensed professional clinical counselor licensee may have to restore his or her retired license to active status without reapplication or re-examination, and clarifies that an inactive license may be eligible for a retired license, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 339, Statutes of 2013.

AB 428 (Eggman) Healing arts: marriage and family therapists: clinical social workers: coursework.

Authorizes certain coursework requirements for licensure as a licensed marriage and family therapist and licensed clinical social worker to be completed through continuing education instead of formal classroom training, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 376, Statutes of 2013.

AB 429 (Daly) Real Estate Commissioner: powers.

Requires the Real Estate commissioner to enforce the provisions and to pursue violations of the Real Estate Law and the Subdivided Lands Law.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 433 (Gordon) Contractors: fire protection systems: fire safety: State Fire Marshal.

Authorizes licensed plumbing contractors to install residential fire protection systems for single- and two-family homes through January 1, 2017.

Last Action: Chapter 377, Statutes of 2013.

AB 451 (Eggman) Healing arts: therapists and counselors: licensing.

Extends the current effective date for new education, examination and eligibility requirements for out-of-state applicants for licensed marriage and family therapist and licensed professional clinical counselor licenses from January 1, 2014 to January 1, 2016, and extends the operation and repeal date for current examination, eligibility and

curriculum requirements for out-of-state applicants from January 1, 2014 to January 1, 2016.

Last Action: Chapter 551, Statutes of 2013.

AB 459 (Mitchell) Public contracts: healthy and sustainable food.

Revises the current "accepted nutritional guidelines" for food and beverages in a vending machine on designated state property, and requires the food and beverages to reach 50% compliance with the revised guidelines beginning January 1, 2015, 75% compliance on January 1, 2016, and 100% compliance on and after January 1, 2017.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 469 (Wagner) Telephonic sellers: loan modifications.

Redefines "telephonic seller" to include a person making a telephone solicitation to arrange or assist in the arrangement of a loan modification, for purposes of an existing law that mandates the registration and regulates the practices of telephonic sellers, and requires those telephonic sellers to file with the Department of Justice specified information for persons who obtained loan modifications for those who responded to the seller's solicitations or representations.

Last Action: Held in Senate Banking and Financial Institutions Committee.

AB 480 (Ian Calderon) Service contracts.

Includes optical products in the current definition of a retail service contract, which would require agreements for pre-paid services relating to the replacement, maintenance or repair of prescription and non-prescription eyewear to be in a written contract, among other duties.

Last Action: Chapter 421, Statutes of 2013.

AB 496 (Gordon) Medicine: sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression.

Reestablishes and expands the Task Force on Culturally and Linguistically Competent Physicians and Dentists to consider the needs of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender groups and report findings to the Legislature and appropriate licensing boards by January 1, 2016, and further requires the Cultural and Linguistic Physician Competency Program to address the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender groups of interest to local medical societies.

Last Action: Held on Senate Floor.

AB 509 (Blumenfield) Consumer affairs.

Makes unlawful under the Consumers Legal Remedies Act the representation of a product as designed, made, or both in a specific city or county, by using a specified "made in" label if the product does not comply with specified standards.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 512 (Rendon) Healing arts: licensure exemption.

Extends from 2014 to 2018 the sunset date of the California licensure exemption for health care practitioners who are licensed or certified in other states and who provide health care services on a voluntary basis to uninsured or underinsured persons in California, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 111, Statutes of 2013.

AB 536 (Wagner) Contractors: payments.

Excludes certain types of claims from the calculation of a "disputed amount" for purposes of an existing law that authorizes the withholding of 150% of a disputed amount from certain payments to contractors when good faith disputes arise in public or private works contracts.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 555 (Salas) Professions and vocations: military and veterans.

Requires a board within the Department of Consumer Affairs to consider, and authorizes a board to accept, for purposes of satisfying licensure requirements, any relevant training an applicant has received during his or her service in the armed forces of the United States, if applicable to licensure requirements, and authorizes a board to consult with the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Military Department when evaluating whether that training is applicable to licensure requirements.

Last Action: This bill was substantially amended to address an unrelated issue: Social security numbers.

AB 630 (Holden) Architects.

Prohibits a person from using an architect's instruments of service without a written contract or written assignment authorizing that use; prohibits an architect from unreasonably withholding consent from the architect's client to use those instruments of service; and specifies that an architect may reasonably withhold consent if full payment has not been made, or if the conditions of the written contract have not been fulfilled.

Last Action: Chapter 453, Statutes of 2013.

AB 634 (Gomez) Private postsecondary education: avocational education.

Requires the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education (BPPE) to promulgate regulations to clarify the definition of avocational education for the purpose of the statute that establishes BPPE and its authority.

Last Action: Held in Senate Business, Professions and Economic Development Committee.

AB 670 (Atkins) Pharmacy Law: incentive payments.

Prohibits a pharmacist or pharmacy employer from receiving compensation for recommending or replacing a patient's originally prescribed drug with a therapeutic alternative, unless the recommendation is part of a comprehensive medication review.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 704 (Blumenfield) Emergency medical services: military experience.

Requires the Emergency Medical Services Authority to adopt regulations by January 1, 2015, to accept the military education, training, and practical experience of applicants, as specified, towards certification as an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)-I and EMT-II, and towards licensure as an EMT-Paramedic.

Last Action: Vetoed.

AB 705 (Blumenfield) Combat to Care Act.

Requires the Board of Registered Nursing to promulgate regulations that identify the military education, training, and experience that is equivalent or transferable to coursework required for licensure as a registered nurse and, upon receipt of an applicant's record of education, training, and experience completed in the Armed Forces, provide the applicant with a list of coursework, if any, that the applicant must complete for license eligibility.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 759 (Daly) Private patrol operators.

Revises all references to private patrol operators in state law to instead refer to private security contractors (PSCs); specifies what a security guard's distinctive uniform may include; and revises the requirements for a qualifying manager of a PSC.

Last Action: Held in Senate Business, Professions and Economic Development Committee.

AB 764 (Linder) Human Remains.

Establishes a pilot program that authorizes the Cemetery and Funeral Bureau to offer a limited crematory license to no more than five alkaline hydrolysis facilities as specified, and repeals that authority on January 1, 2020.

Last Action: Held in Senate Environmental Quality Committee.

AB 791 (Hagman) Collateral recovery: repossessors.

Prohibits a reposessor from selling repossessed collateral or accepting payment from a debtor in lieu of repossession, forbids a repossession agency from disclosing personal employee information, as specified, and authorizes a reposessor to wear certain identification, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 340, Statutes of 2013.

AB 801 (Brown) Junk dealers and recyclers: nonferrous materials.

Requires junk dealers and recyclers to obtain certain information before providing payment for nonferrous materials marked with indicia of ownership, and requires that information to be retained as part of the written record of purchase.

Last action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 808 (Fong) Acupuncture: license requirements.

Requires applicants for an acupuncture license to pass a practical examination in addition to the existing written examination, beginning January 1, 2016.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 809 (Logue) Healing arts: telehealth.

Clarifies that the initiating health care provider must only inform the patient and receive verbal consent for the use of telehealth at the outset of care.

Last Action: Held in Senate Health Committee.

AB 811 (Lowenthal) Excavations: regional notification center system: contractor certification.

Requires regional notification centers to compile and make available on their Internet Web sites an annual report based on statewide information from operators and excavators regarding mishaps and violations related to excavation.

Last Action: Chapter 250, Statutes of 2013.

AB 830 (Holden) Clinical laboratories.

Requires the State Department of Public Health to promulgate regulations to require hospitals and health care facilities that employ clinical laboratory scientists and medical laboratory technicians to provide specified training to those individuals and any other employees charged with supervising those individuals.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 836 (Skinner) Dentists: continuing education.

Restricts the continuing education requirement hours for retired active dentists who provide only uncompensated care at a maximum of 60% of that required for non-retired active dentists, and requires the Dental Board of California to report on the status of retired active dentists who provide only uncompensated care during its next sunset report.

Last Action: Chapter 299, Statutes of 2013.

AB 841 (Torres) Junk dealers and recyclers: nonferrous materials: payment.

Requires a junk dealer or recycler to pay a seller of nonferrous materials by mailed check only, and prohibits sellers from picking up a cash or check payment in person.

Last Action: Vetoed.

AB 851 (Logue) Dentistry: licensure and certification requirements: military experience.

Requires the Dental Board of California to accept any education, training, or practical experience completed by an applicant in military service if it is equivalent to the licensure standards of the board, as specified, and requires certain schools seeking accreditation or approval, by July 1, 2014, to have procedures to accept an applicant's military education, training, and practical experience toward the completion of a board-approved educational program. Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 854 (Stone) Locksmithing.

Requires a locksmith, when making a key for a residence or commercial establishment, to obtain the e-mail address in addition to other information of the person requesting or purchasing the key, and increases the retention of the work order from two to four years.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 864 (Skinner) Athletic trainers.

Establishes the Athletic Training Practice Act to license and regulate athletic trainers through the creation of an Athletic Trainer Licensing Committee under the Physical Therapy Board of California, to commence on July 1, 2014 and expire on January 1, 2019.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 867 (Yamada) Aeronautics: meteorological towers: markings.

Requires, by January 1, 2015, meteorological towers located outside the boundaries of an incorporated city, or on or within one mile of prime agricultural land, to be marked, as specified.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 890 (Jones) False advertising.

Aligns California with the federal standard regarding the use of the terms "Made in U.S.A.," "Made in America," "U.S.A." or similar words when a product or any portion of the product was not substantially produced in the United States.

Last Action: Held in Senate Judiciary Committee.

AB 916 (Eggman) Healing arts: false or misleading advertising.

Prohibits a physician from using the terms "board," "certified," or "certification" in advertising unless those terms are used in reference to a certifying board that meets specified criteria.

Last Action: Held in Senate Business, Professions and Economic Development Committee.

AB 964 (Bonta) Vehicles: dealers.

Prohibits a vehicle from being advertised or sold if the dealer knows or should have known that the vehicle is subject to a manufacturer's safety recall, allows non-certified used vehicles to be sold if accompanied by a written disclosure, and requires dealers who sell vehicles at retail to provide buyers with written disclosure identifying whether certain conditions are present, if the dealer knows or should know of that condition, except as specified.

Last Action: Held on Assembly Floor.

AB 980 (Pan) Primary care clinics: abortion.

Requires the California Building Standards Commission, in conjunction with the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development, to repeal certain regulations and

sections of the California Building Standards Code that treat primary clinics that provide abortion services differently from those that do not.

Last Action: Chapter 663, Statutes of 2013.

AB 983 (Melendez) Self-service storage facilities.

Requires the occupant of a self-storage facility unit to bring a court action to delay a lien sale for nonpayment of rent or fees rather than requiring the storage facility owner to file suit to enforce the lien, and allows the storage facility owner to have a vehicle, watercraft or trailer towed from the premises after 60 days for nonpayment of rent or fees.

Last Action: Held in Senate Judiciary Committee.

AB 993 (Linder) Contractors: arbitration.

Revises and updates the provisions relating to the Contractors State License Board's arbitration program that provides for an alternative dispute resolution process between consumers and contractors for claims up to \$50,000; clarifies the arbitration process, the arbitrator's authority, and the awarding of attorney's fees, as specified; and makes other clarifying, technical and conforming changes.

Last Action: Held in Senate Judiciary Committee.

AB 1000 (Wieckowski and Maienschein) Physical therapists: direct access to services: professional corporations.

Allows patients to access physical therapy services without a referral for 45 calendar days or 12 visits, whichever comes first, after which the patient must receive an in-person examination from a physician and surgeon or podiatrist, who must also sign off on the physical therapist's plan of care; expands the types of licensed professionals permitted to work for a professional corporation; and permits a licensed physical therapist to be a shareholder, officer, or director of a medical and podiatric professional corporation, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 620, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1003 (Maienschein) Professional corporations: healing arts practitioners.

Authorizes any person licensed under the Business and Professions Code, the Chiropractic Act, or the Osteopathic Act to be employed to render professional services by a professional corporation, as specified.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1013 (Gomez) Consumer affairs.

Authorizes an employee designated by the Attorney General, when the Attorney General has intervened in a pending matter or proceeding before any agency, court, or department, to represent the interests of consumers, for that purpose to present evidence and arguments before that agency, court or department.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1017 (Gomez) Incoming telephone calls: messages.

Requires a state agency to establish a procedure for incoming phone calls that will enable a caller to leave a message, and further requires that the message be returned within 3 business days, or 72 hours, whichever is earlier.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1028 (Patterson) Vocational nursing: interim permits.

Authorizes an applicant for licensure as a vocational nurse to submit an application for an interim permit at the same time as the applicant submits his or her application for licensure by examination, and requires the Board of Vocational Nursing and Psychiatric Technicians to issue the interim permit, if it chooses to do so, within 60 days of receiving the completed application.

Last Action: Chapter 301, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1045 (Quirk-Silva) Sterile compounding and nonresident pharmacies.

Requires a recipient pharmacy, prescriber, or patient of a recalled drug and the California Board of Pharmacy to be notified within 12 hours of a recall notice for a sterile compounded drug, and requires the automatic suspension, cancellation, or revocation of a California pharmacy license if an out-of-state pharmacy's home state license is suspended, cancelled, or revoked.

Last Action: Chapter 302, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1057 (Medina) Professions and vocations: licenses: military service.

Requires licensing boards within the Department of Consumer Affairs, beginning January 1, 2015, to ask on every application for licensure if the applicant is serving in, or has previously served in, the military.

Last Action: Chapter 693, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1063 (Eggman) Surveyors and engineers.

Provides title protection for city and county engineers and surveyors by prohibiting the use of the title engineer or surveyor unless an individual is a licensed professional engineer or professional surveyor; authorizes a licensed surveyor or civil engineer to include additional information filed with a record of survey, as specified; and requires a local public agency's land survey marker to identify the land surveyor or civil engineer that set it.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

AB 1095 (Nestande) Junk dealers and recyclers: nonferrous materials.

Requires a junk dealer or recycler to provide payment to the seller of nonferrous materials by check only and no sooner than 30 days after the date of sale, unless the seller meets specified criteria, and prohibits a junk dealer or recycler from selling or disposing of those materials for 30 days.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1114 (Achadjian) Contractors: home improvement contracts.

Repeals the prohibition against contractors paying, crediting, or allowing any consideration or compensation of any kind to any other contractor or salesperson other than a licensee for, or on account of, the performance of a work of improvement or services, including, but not limited to, home improvement services.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1136 (Levine) Pharmacists: drug disclosures.

Requires a pharmacist, on and after January 1, 2014, if a pharmacist exercising his or her professional judgment determines that a drug may impair a person's ability to operate a vehicle or vessel, to include a written label on the drug container indicating that the drug may impair a person's ability to operate a vehicle or vessel. Permits the label to be printed on an auxiliary label that is affixed to the prescription container. Makes other technical and clarifying changes.

Last Action: Chapter 304, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1139 (Lowenthal) Prescriptions: biosimilar products.

Permits a pharmacist to substitute a biological pharmaceutical product with a comparable biosimilar product, provided that biosimilar product is deemed by the federal Food and Drug Administration to be interchangeable with the prescribed biological product.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1141 (Dahle) Franchises.

Establishes the Small Business Investment Protection Act of 2013, which revises and recasts the relationship between a franchisee and a franchisor.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Judiciary Committee.

AB 1147 (Gomez) Massage therapy.

Revises the qualifications for certification as a massage practitioner and massage therapist, and allows a city, county, or city and county to require the owner of a massage business to obtain a revocable certificate of registration, as specified.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1153 (Eggman) Master esthetician: license.

Allows the Board of Barbering and Cosmetology to offer a master esthetician skin care license and establishes the educational and practical requirements for the examination application.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1174 (Bocanegra) Dental professionals: teledentistry under Medi-Cal.

Expands the scope of practice for registered dental assistants, registered dental assistants in extended function, and registered dental hygienists to better enable the practice of teledentistry in accordance with the findings of a Health Workforce Pilot Program, and enables reimbursement by Medi-Cal for Virtual Dental Home treatment.
Last Action: Held in Assembly Health Committee.

AB 1177 (Bocanegra) Structural fumigation.

Extends to January 1, 2018 the sunset date for the Structural Fumigation Enforcement Program (Program) under the Department of Pesticide Regulation for Los Angeles, Orange, Santa Clara, and San Diego Counties; increases from \$5 to \$8 the fee paid under the Program; revises certain reporting requirements; and authorizes a county agricultural commissioner to require payment of delinquent fees, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 596, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1215 (Hagman and Holden) Clinical laboratories.

Redefines the term "laboratory director" to authorize a licensed clinical laboratory scientist to operate as the director of a clinical laboratory when performing simple tests exempted from the federal Clinical Laboratory Improvements Amendments of 1988.

Last Action: Chapter 199, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1236 (Hagman) Contractors: limited liability companies.

Authorizes a licensed contractor organized as a limited liability company (LLC) to obtain limited liability insurance from an eligible surplus line insurer licensed in another state, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 114, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1260 (Medina) California family owned business.

Defines a California family owned business and states the intent of the Legislature to aid and assist the interests of California family owned businesses.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1269 (Gray) Medicine: special faculty permit.

Clarifies that the Medical Board of California, and not the nonexistent Division of Licensing, may establish an applicant's eligibility for a special faculty permit to practice medicine exclusively within a medical school and any affiliated institution.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

AB 1278 (Hueso) Integrative cancer treatment.

Prohibits a physician from recommending, prescribing, or providing integrative cancer treatment, as defined, to cancer patients unless certain requirements are met.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Health Committee.

AB 1288 (V. Manuel Pérez) Medical Board of California and Osteopathic Medical Board of California: licensing: application processing.

Requires the Medical Board of California and the Osteopathic Medical Board of California to develop a priority review process for applicants for a physician and surgeon's certificate who demonstrate their intent to practice in a medically underserved area or serve a medically underserved population, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 307, Statutes of 2013.

AB 1308 (Bonilla) Midwifery.

Revises the scope of practice for a licensed midwife (LM) to remove the requirement of supervision by a physician and surgeon; authorizes an LM to directly obtain supplies and devices, obtain and administer drugs and diagnostic tests, order testing, and receive reports that are necessary to his or her practice of midwifery; and authorizes an LM to attend cases of normal birth.

Last Action: Chapter 665, Statutes of 2013.

ACA 5 (Grove) Abortion: parental notification.

Requires a physician and surgeon, prior to performing an abortion on an unemancipated minor, to either deliver written notice to the parent of the minor or have received a waiver of parental notice from the parent of the minor or from the court, as specified, and requires the physician and surgeon to provide specified information to the State Department of Public Health.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Health Committee.

SB 12 (Corbett) Consumer affairs.

Creates the Made in California Program within the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz) to promote products manufactured in California, and authorizes GO-Biz to develop and adopt standards that would permit a company to represent that a product is made in California.

Last Action: Chapter 541, Statutes of 2013.

SB 62 (Lieu) Coroners: reporting requirements: prescription drug use.

Requires a coroner to report to the Medical Board of California when he or she receives information indicating that a death was caused by a Schedule II, III, or IV drug, as specified, until January 1, 2018.

Last Action: Vetoed.

SB 119 (Ron Calderon) Crematories: burning of flags.

Authorizes a crematory to incinerate an American flag or flags separately from human remains within one week before or after Memorial Day, Flag Day, or Independence Day, and requires a crematory to maintain a record of all flags incinerated.

Last Action: Chapter 205, Statutes of 2013.

SB 152 (Roth) Licensed professionals: engineers: geologists: geophysicists.

Deletes the current provisions allowing a temporary authorization to practice engineering, geology, and geophysics, and requires the use of a written contract when contracting to provide geological or geophysical services, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 178, Statutes of 2013.

SB 198 (Lieu) Physical Therapy Board of California.

Reorganizes and recasts the Physical Therapy Act (Act), eliminates redundant and outdated provisions, updates and clarifies numerous provisions, makes other technical and conforming changes, and renumbers various sections within the Act.

Last Action: Chapter 389, Statutes of 2013.

SB 202 (Galgiani) Automotive repair.

Authorizes the Bureau of Automotive Repair to regulate businesses that change and repair tires as an automotive repair dealer.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

SB 204 (Corbett) Prescription drugs: labeling.

Requires, beginning January 1, 2016, translations of the directions for use in non-English languages published on the Board of Pharmacy's Internet Website to be used, as applicable, when labeling a prescription container.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Health Committee.

SB 205 (Corbett) Prescription drugs: labeling.

Deletes and recasts existing law on labeling requirements for prescription containers, and requires, beginning January 1, 2016, the following information currently required to be included on the label of a prescription container to be printed in 12-point sans serif typeface: 1) the manufacturer's trade or generic name of the drug and the name of the manufacturer, as specified; 2) directions for the use of the drug; 3) name of the patient or patients; 4) strength of the drug or drugs dispensed; and 5) the condition or purpose for which the drug was prescribed, if indicated on the prescription.

Last Action: Vetoed.

SB 218 (Yee) Healing arts: California traditional Chinese medicine traumatologist certification.

Authorizes the creation of a non-profit California Traditional Chinese Medicine Traumatology Council (Council), requires the Council to develop standards for the education and training of applicants, and authorizes the Council to issue certificates to qualified applicants to practice as a California certified traditional Chinese medicine traumatologist and to discipline certificate holders for specified violations.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

SB 243 (Wyland) Professional clinical counselors.

Revises the current training and education requirements for licensed professional clinical counselors in order for them to complete the training required for treatment of couples or families during a degree program, rather than after the program.

Last Action: Chapter 465, Statutes of 2013.

SB 256 (Lieu) Trampoline courts: safety inspection.

Requires the Division of Occupational Safety and Health within the Department of Industrial Relations to formulate and propose rules and regulations that establish a state safety program for the inspection of trampoline courts.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

SB 261 (Monning) Contractors: fraudulent use of license.

Authorizes the Contractors State License Board (CSLB) to take administrative action against a licensed or unlicensed person for the improper use of a contractor's license, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 163, Statutes of 2013.

SB 262 (Monning) Contractors.

Requires the person qualifying on behalf of a contracting firm to be responsible for exercising direct supervision and control in order to secure compliance with the Contractors State License Law, and provides that failure to exercise direct supervision and control constitutes a cause for disciplinary action that is punishable as a misdemeanor.

Last Action: Chapter 180, Statutes of 2013.

SB 263 (Monning) Contractors: unlicensed activity.

Clarifies the misdemeanor penalty for a person engaging in the business of a contractor to also include a person who has never been a licensed contractor, or a person who was licensed but who acts under a license that is inactive, expired, revoked, or under suspension for any reason.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions, and Consumer Protection Committee.

SB 269 (Hill) Prepaid rental listing service.

Expands the enforcement powers of the Bureau of Real Estate over prepaid rental listing services (PRLS) licensees, authorizes consumers harmed by PRLS providers to seek compensation from the Consumer Recovery Account, increases application fees for the PRLS license to better fund the Account, and requires licensees to provide prospective clients with a written notice of the consumer's rights.

Last Action: Chapter 436, Statutes of 2013.

SB 272 (Corbett) Advertising and solicitations: government and military endorsements.

Restricts the use of military or government terms, symbols, and content that reasonably could be interpreted or construed as implying connection, approval, or endorsement of any product or service.

Last Action: Chapter 695, Statutes of 2013.

SB 294 (Emmerson) Sterile drug products.

Expands the types of sterile compounded drugs for which a license is required, deletes the licensing exemption for certain types of pharmacies, and requires inspection of nonresident sterile compounding pharmacies by the Board of Pharmacy.

Last Action: Chapter 565, Statutes of 2013.

SB 304 (Lieu) Healing arts: boards.

Revises the Medical Practice Act to transfer inspectors and medical consultants from the Medical Board of California (MBC) to the Division of Investigation within the Department of Consumer Affairs, extends the sunset date of MBC by four years, and amends the Veterinary Practice Act to extend its sunset date by two years.

Last Action: Chapter 515, Statutes of 2013.

SB 305 (Lieu) Healing arts: boards.

Extends until January 1, 2018, the sunset dates for the provisions establishing the Naturopathic Medicine Committee, the Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology and Hearing Aid Dispensers Board (SLPAHADB), the Board of Occupational Therapy, the Physical Therapy Board of California (PTB), the Board of Optometry (BOO), and the Respiratory Care Board of California (RCB), which are regulated by the Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA); extends the term of the executive officers of the PTB, SLPAHADB, RCB, and the BOO; provides that certain acts of sexual abuse or

misconduct may result in denial or revocation of licensure, or may be deemed unprofessional conduct by the BOO; specifies that any board, committee or bureau regulated by DCA is authorized to receive specified criminal records needed to complete an application for licensure; exempts certain individuals performing pulmonary tests in specified hospitals in Los Angeles County from certain licensure requirements; and subjects specified boards to review by the appropriate legislative policy committees, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 516, Statutes of 2013.

SB 306 (Torres) Pharmacy: dangerous drugs and dangerous devices: automated drug delivery systems.

Permits group practices to dispense prescription drugs through an automated drug delivery system.

Last Action: Held in the Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

SB 308 (Lieu) Professions and vocations.

Extends until January 1, 2018, the provisions of the Interior Design Law and the Board of Guide Dogs for the Blind; extends until January 1, 2016, the provisions of the Board of Barbering and Cosmetology and the term of its executive officer; and makes various other technical changes and improvements to those provisions.

Last Action: Chapter 333, Statutes of 2013.

SB 309 (Lieu) State Athletic Commission.

Extends, until January 1, 2016, the operation of the California State Athletic Commission (Commission), which regulates professional and amateur boxing, kickboxing, and martial arts contests and exhibitions; enacts fee increases and spending restrictions to ensure the financial sustainability and appropriate operation of the Commission; deletes the training gymnasium license and creates a professional trainer's license; and expands the Commission's authority to delegate and revoke regulatory oversight of amateur contests.

Last Action: Chapter 370, Statutes of 2013.

SB 352 (Pavley) Medical assistants: supervision.

Authorizes medical assistants to perform technical supportive services in any medical setting upon specific authorization of a physician assistant, nurse practitioner, or certified nurse-midwife without a physician and surgeon on the premises.

Last Action: Chapter 286, Statutes of 2013.

SB 445 (Hill) Pharmacies: advertising: controlled substances.

Prohibits pharmacies from advertising the sale or dispensing of controlled substances.

Last Action: This bill was substantially amended to address an unrelated issue:

Revenue bond financing of prison construction.

SB 465 (Correa) Packaging and labeling: containers: slack fill.

Revises the definition for "nonfunctional slack fill" prohibited in packaged goods to require that nonfunctional slack fill be substantially less than the allowed capacity, and clarifies a particular exemption to require the actual size of the product be clearly and conspicuously depicted on any side of the exterior packaging except the bottom.
Last Action: Chapter 429, Statutes of 2013.

SB 482 (Hill) Point-of-sale systems.

Deletes the January 1, 2014, sunset date on a provision of existing law allowing local officials to verify the accuracy of point-of-sale transaction systems.
Last Action: Chapter 166, Statutes of 2013.

SB 484 (Wyland) Tax preparers.

Revises the composition of the California Tax Education Council (CTEC), authorizes CTEC to deny, suspend, or revoke a tax preparer's registration for specified violations, and makes other related changes to the Tax Preparers Law.
Last Action: Chapter 660, Statutes of 2013.

SB 485 (Ron Calderon) Weighmasters: junk dealers and recyclers.

Requires a junk dealer or recycler to submit additional information regarding its junk dealer business to the Department of Food and Agriculture (DFA) when applying for a weighmaster's license or a renewal license; requires the DFA to complete an investigation of the information on the application or renewal within a specified period of time and revoke the license if the information submitted in the application or renewal is materially inaccurate; increases the fees that junk dealers or recyclers pay for each fixed location; and sunsets these provisions on January 1, 2019.
Last Action: Chapter 518, Statutes of 2013.

SB 491 (Hernandez) Nurse practitioners.

Permits a nurse practitioner (NP) to practice independently after a period of physician supervision if the NP has national certification and liability insurance, and authorizes the NP to perform various other specified tasks related to the practice of nursing without protocols.
Last Action: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee.

SB 492 (Hernandez) Optometrists: practice: licensure.

Permits an optometrist to diagnose, treat and manage additional conditions with ocular manifestations; directs the California Board of Optometry to establish educational and examination requirements; and permits optometrists to perform vaccinations and surgical and non-surgical primary care procedures, as specified.
Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

SB 493 (Hernandez) Pharmacy practice.

Expands the pharmacist scope of practice to recognize an "advanced practice pharmacist"; permits pharmacists to furnish certain hormonal contraceptives, nicotine replacement products, and prescription medications for travel; and authorizes

pharmacists to independently initiate and administer certain vaccines and treatments for severe allergic reactions.

Last Action: Chapter 469, Statutes of 2013.

SB 562 (Galgiani) Dentists: mobile or portable dental units.

Requires the Dental Board of California to develop registration and operating regulations for mobile dental units and dental practices that routinely use portable dental units, and deletes restrictions limiting dentists to operating only one mobile dental clinic.

Last Action: Chapter 624, Statutes of 2013.

SB 578 (Wyland) Marriage and family therapists: unprofessional conduct.

Specifies that engaging in a dual relationship with a client that is likely to impair the professional judgment of the licensee or lead to exploitation of the client constitutes unprofessional conduct.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

SB 598 (Hill) Biosimilars.

Permits a pharmacist to substitute a biological pharmaceutical with a biosimilar pharmaceutical in the same manner as generic drugs are substituted, and for prescriptions filled prior to January 1, 2017, requires the pharmacist to notify the prescriber.

Last Action: Vetoed.

SB 610 (Jackson) Franchises.

Revises the California Franchise Relations Act to explicitly require franchisors and franchisees to deal with each other in good faith, as defined, in the performance and enforcement of a franchise agreement; prohibits a franchisor from restricting the right of a franchisee to join or participate in an association of franchisees; and authorizes a private right of action for violation of these provisions that may be remedied by injunctive relief, damages, rescission, reasonable costs, or attorneys' fees.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

SB 662 (Galgiani) Structural pest control operators: financial responsibility.

Increases the minimum limit for liability insurance for a structural pest control company to \$500,000; increases the amount of the surety bond required to maintain a license or company registration to \$12,500; and increases the upper limit of a surety bond required for issuance, reissuance, or restoration of a license or company registration, after a suspension or revocation, to \$25,000.

Last Action: Chapter 218, Statutes of 2013.

SB 669 (Huff) Emergency medical care: epinephrine auto-injectors.

Permits a prehospital emergency medical care person or lay rescuer to obtain and use an epinephrine auto-injector in emergency situations with certification of training, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 725, Statutes of 2013.

SB 670 (Steinberg) Physicians and surgeons: drug prescribing privileges: investigation.

Authorizes the Medical Board of California to inspect and copy a deceased patient's medical records, clarifies language relating to unprofessional conduct, and permits an interim suspension order to place restrictions on a physician's prescribing privileges, as specified

Last Action: Chapter 399, Statutes of 2013.

SB 676 (Block) Real estate records: unlawful destruction.

Authorizes the Bureau of Real Estate (BRE) to suspend or revoke a real estate license if the licensee knowingly destroys, alters, conceals, mutilates, or falsifies any of the books, accounts, or records that are required to be maintained or are sought by the Commissioner of the BRE, as specified.

Last Action: Chapter 349, Statutes of 2013.

SB 679 (Berryhill) Licensees: reporting requirements.

Revises the monetary threshold for a licensed engineer or land surveyor to report a civil action settlement or administrative action to the Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors, and Geologists (Board) from "\$50,000 or greater" to "greater than \$50,000;" and requires a licensed engineer or land surveyor to report to the Board any civil action judgment or binding arbitration award or administrative action of \$25,000 or greater.

Last Action: Chapter 471, Statutes of 2013.

SB 686 (Jackson) Vehicles: vehicle dealers.

Prohibits a vehicle dealer from selling, leasing, renting, loaning, or otherwise transferring ownership of a used vehicle if the dealer knows or should have known that the vehicle is subject to a manufacturer's safety recall, and places similar restrictions on the sale or transfer of ownership of a used vehicle by a rental car company that is also a licensed dealer.

Last Action: Held in Assembly Business, Professions and Consumer Protection Committee.

SB 757 (Berryhill) Junk dealers and recyclers.

Authorizes a junk dealer or recycler to accept as valid seller identification a passport from any country or a Matricula Consular issued by Mexico when buying newspaper or California Redemption Value containers, and clarifies that the definition of a "secondhand dealer" does not include a "junk dealer."

Last Action: Held on Assembly Floor.

SB 762 (Hill) Secondhand goods: lost, stolen, or embezzled items.

Clarifies the interests of licensed pawnbrokers and secondhand dealers relating to the seizure and disposition of property during a criminal investigation or case.

Last Action: Chapter 318, Statutes of 2013.

SB 809 (DeSaulnier and Steinberg) Controlled substances: reporting.

Establishes a funding mechanism to update and maintain the Controlled Substance Utilization Review and Evaluation System (CURES) and Prescription Drug Monitoring Program, requires all prescribing health care practitioners to apply to access CURES information, and establishes processes and procedures for regulating prescribing licensees through CURES and securing private information.

Last Action: Chapter 400, Statutes of 2013.

SB 821 (Committee on Business, Professions and Economic Development) Healing arts.

Makes several technical and noncontroversial changes to provisions within the Business and Professions Code relating to the regulation of the Dental Board of California, Board of Optometry Board of Behavioral Sciences, as well as dental hygienists regulated under the Welfare and Institutions Code.

Last Action: Chapter 473, Statutes of 2013.

SB 822 (Committee on Business, Professions and Economic Development) Professions and vocations.

Makes several technical and noncontroversial changes to provisions within the Business and Professions Code relating to the regulation of various professions, including those overseen by the California Board of Accountancy, the Contractors' State License Board, the Board of Guide Dogs for the Blind, and the Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors and Geologists.

Last Action: Chapter 319, Statutes of 2013.

SB 823 (Committee on Business, Professions and Economic Development) Professions and vocations: licensure.

Revises the qualifications for certified public accountant licensure in order to smooth the transition to the new requirements for some applicants, and reestablishes certain provisions regarding the administration of the Transcript Reimbursement Fund operated by the Court Reporters Board of California.

Last Action: Chapter 474, Statutes of 2013.
